The North Otago Section NZAC built Elcho Hut, in the Hopkins valley, in 1938. The section has carried out regular maintenance traditionally scheduled around the winter solstice. The timing gives the best chance of 4WD access as the freezing temperatures generally mean the river levels are low. The Hopkins river has a reputation for swallowing vehicles.

The work parties have been increasingly popular over the last few years and we had 18 people arrive at the hut by lunchtime on Saturday. Many of our active members now have families, and we encourage them to bring their children—these are our future volunteers. We also like to have along volunteers who have given their time at the local climbing wall. This year we had representation from six nations, a 50/50 gender balance, a 72 year age range, three generations of the Shearer family and the NZAC president.

Tūpiki Trust

We are pleased to announce the launch of the NZAC Tūpiki Trust. The trust has registered charitable status and is thus able to accept donations and bequests from anyone who would like to support climbing, and to protect New Zealand maunga, crags and climbing areas into the future. Tūpiki Trust has been founded by John Nankervis, Geoff Gabites, Dave Bamford and Ross Cullen, who all have a long-involvement both with NZAC and the New Zealand mountains. Past President of NZAC, Lindsay Smith, has come onto the Trust board to join the founding trustees, who have lost foundation chair John Nankervis in January this year. Margaret Fyfe has agreed to be Patron of the Trust.

The aim of Tūpiki Trust is to accumulate funds in order to make grants to support New Zealand Alpine Club projects and other mountain-related ventures. This has been evidenced at launch with a \$200,000 commitment to support Aspiring Hut restoration, commitment to provide funding for the ClimbNZ upgrade project and commitment to support Mature Mountaineers meets in a further four centres.

The Will Kennedy/Andy Anderson Alpine Scrapbook 1925-1952

Early this year Warwick Anderson delivered a scrapbook filled with newspaper clippings to the New Zealand Alpine Club. He found it while clearing out the estate of his father, Andy Anderson, some years prior. Andy had been a friend of Will Kennedy an early NZAC & CMC stalwart.

Grant Hunter was called upon to cast an expert eye over the scrapbook and accompanying loose clippings. There was no hesitation in calling for the preservation of this historical and diverse collection of articles dating from the 1920's through to the 1950's.
