SECTION NIGHTS OTAGO UNIVERSITY STAFF CLUB WEDNESDAY 5TH JULY 7.30PM



UPCOMING TRIPS


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CELEBRATE MATARIKI AT ASPIRING HUT – 14-16TH JULY

'MOUNTAIN DREAMING'

LOCAL LITERATURE PROJECT REPORT

You may have seen 'Mountain Dreaming', a recent publication written by Peter Strang and designed by Riley Smith. In this article Riley reflects on the design within the book, talking through some of his ideas and process. He is currently preparing for his next book project that you will likely hear about in a few months. Watch this space!

Late in 2021, veteran alpinist Peter Strang read out a selection of his mountain poetry at a New Zealand Alpine Club meeting in Ōtepoti. He had written them over the span of more than 60 years in cold, remote places within Aotearoa and around the world. A humble man, Pete is considered one of the pioneers of the climbing movement in Aotearoa.

No sporting community is more connected with the printed word than climbers, who have recorded route observations, tales of misadventure, tragedy and heroic expeditions since the sport's inception.

While new climbing literature is predominantly screen-based, a small printrun felt better aligned with Pete's dedication to the climbing community and whenua.





Mountain Dreaming is a collection of poetry inspired by mountains, but also by life, its conundrums and unanswered questions. A unique perspective on kiwi climbing culture for enthusiasts to appreciate, connect with and be inspired by. The publication needed to be crafted as a keepsake. Considerations for the age demographic of the audience and respect for the extremely personal content drove the design and format. Larger font sizes, negative space and minimal layouts all aid readers to engage fully with the written word. The lighter poems in Part 1 lead the reader gently into Part 2's melancholic mountain elegies to Peter's departed son Jeremy. These are each given a blank facing page to give space for deeper audience reflection. The third and final sections provide a new warmth transitioning to a time of learning and growth. Climbers often head to the hills with a book and a pencil, the bare minimum required to mark paper. This inspired the hand-drawn aesthetic, which attempts to bridge the gap between the feel of a field notebook, and a traditional printed publication, harnessing the respect given to serif words, but allowing the playful nature of the content to inspire further reading.

The local section of the New Zealand Alpine Club covered the initial fee to print 200 copies. Hand-printed T-shirts, unique paper bags (with each copy), event posters and an assortment of stickers were produced to compliment the books. The launch drew people from around the South Island, and funds raised through sales covered the returned printing fee and raised \$1500 for Aotearoa Climbing charity, The Tūpiki Trust.

"The Right Track (TRT) Otago team would like to thank you for the donation of the old/used climbing ropes. TRT is a programme that targets driving offenders and is run over eight sessions with a range of experiential learning activities and experiences that educates, motivates, challenges, and inspires people to help them make better decisions and choices in the future. I am a nurse at Dunedin hospital and volunteer on the programme along side other volunteers from St John, Police, FENZ, Council, Court Services, and a funeral director etc. We currently run 2-3 programmes a year and have to fundraise for the programme so the donation of the ropes was greatly appreciated."

- To hire gear and organise pick up/drop off, fill in the form at https://tiny.cc/gearhire. You MUST email Chris (Wanaka) or Bryce (Queenstown) to let them know you have requested gear. They will respond with payment and pick-up arrangements.
- · Minimum hire is 2 days.
- When hiring the Avalanche set (transceiver, shovel, probe), please supply your own 1 x AA alkaline non-rechargeable battery.
- Gear is hired with the expectation that it will be returned clean and tidy, if gear is lost or damaged, replacement cost will be charged
- Gear can be reserved in advance by paying in full via bank transfer
- All gear must be paid for on booking.
