Hut Updates for Summer 2023/2024

As advised in last month's newsletter the Club has made the decision to **add Homer Hut on to our booking system**. This is now live and is being well used. The high season of 11 December 2023 through to February 11th 2024 is for members only to ensure you can all get your climbing fix. The new lock is electronic and means the code can be remotely changed. We hope with a frequent change of code this will act as a deterrent for anyone wanting to stay and not pay. Cameras have also been installed in the outside foyer and over the carpark.

Get Involved

Mountaineers, human waste, Aoraki and Cultural Values

Research

This project explores current human waste management of mountaineers who climb in the higher mountains around Aoraki/Mt Cook National Park. We are asking you to complete a survey to examine motivations and current practices of mountaineers in terms of human waste disposal, the

barriers to recommended Leave-No-Trace practices, and knowledge of Māori values.

Who should participate?

Mountaineers: we use a broad definition of mountaineering as travel and / or climbing on snow, ice and rock in alpine areas.

We are asking mountaineers (over 18 years of age) and who have mountaineered in Aotearoa New Zealand to participate in this research.

Who is involved?

The study is being conducted by an interdisciplinary team led by University of Canterbury alongside Te Rūnanga o Arowhenua and funded by the Tūpiki Trust, University of Canterbury, the New Zealand Alpine Club and Leave No Trace New Zealand.

Tüpiki Trust Successful Grant Applications

Tūpiki Trust is pleased to announce three further successful grant applications.

A grant of \$19,000 has been approved to Backcountry Trust for rejuvenation of Almer Hut. Almer Hut is a valued high alpine hut on the side of the Franz Josef Glacier and is managed as an historic hut. The Department of Conservation will work with Backcountry Trust builders on a joint restoration project in February 2024 to remove lead from the hut, re-clad the building, replace rotten timber, repaint and make it weather tight. Work on Almer is now relatively urgent. A recent storm event lifted off the roofing from the porch area and folded it back onto the main roof. DOC has temporarily repaired and sealed this before the major renovation starts in February.

Backcountry Trust also received a grant of \$15,000 to allow re-roofing Lockwood Shelter at Temple Basin. This project is planned in partnership with Canterbury Mountaineering Club (CMC), who have had a Management Agreement with DOC to maintain this facility since 2012. The work is planned for summer 2024 with further phases likely after the roof work is completed.

The third successful applicant is Via Ferrata Aotearoa (a registered charity) who will receive \$30,000 to develop a via ferrata on Takaka Hill. The project will build New Zealand's first free and public via ferrata climbing park on Takaka Hill and to further promote the concept in New Zealand.
