
Bill Denz Award Recipients 2024

Judging will commence soon, and the winners announced, keep an eye on our socials and website.



Tūpiki Trust Update

The Tūpiki Trust's impact on climbing in Aotearoa continues to grow, thanks to the generous donations which make their mahi possible. Applications for their latest Grants Round closed this week, with 15 organisations putting forward their projects for consideration, asking for over \$600,000 in financial support. Over the next few weeks, the Tūpiki Trust Board will carefully review each application to judge its long-term value to climbing or the climbing environment and will let the applicants know of their decisions as quickly as possible. The Trust will publicly announce their decisions in their Summer Newsletter – expected out in early November, along with their Annual Report for 2023-24, and these will be posted on their website www.tupikitrust.org.nz. Their next Grants Ground is open now – and closes in March 2025, so if you have a project worthy of consideration for funding or would like to contribute to the Trust as a donor, their website has all the details.



Invincible Spirit by Lyn McKinnon

Dan Bryant was the first New Zealander to climb on Everest. That's nearly 100 years ago, and today many alpinists have never heard of him.

Dan Bryant with Rod Syme was the first to climb the Syme Ridge of Mt Tasman, and the first with Lud Mahan to climb the east ridge of Aoraki/Mt

Cook, still a formidable task.

There are records of all sorts. But these hark back to a spell-binding time when snows and ridges and glaciers and plateaus were virgin territory. Dan Bryant was there. For some of us, he still is.

Read all about him, and his incredible commitment before he lost his life at 52, not to a mountain or an avalanche or a crevasse, but to a ridiculously simple motor car accident.
